

Tiziana Carraro graduated in piano and opera singing. She made her debut at the Festival della Valle d'Itria of Martina Franca in 1991 in the role of Aquilio in Farnace by Vivaldi, and was very successful with the public and the critics and she returned several times to sing at the same festival.

In 1994 she won a young opera singer competition by "Amici del Loggione del Teatro Alla Scala", and also the AsLiCo competition that allowed her to make her debut in the title role of La Diavolessa by Galuppi.

She performed in major Italian and International theatres such as : Athens, Avenches, Berlin, Budapest, Macerata, Modena, Montecarlo, Moscow, Naples, New York, Parma, Piacenza, Pisa, Ravenna, Reutlingen, Rovigo, Tel Aviv, Treviso, Venice, Verona and Washington.

She made her debut in some of the main roles for mezzosoprano such as : Amneris in Aida, Eboli in Don Carlo, Quickly in Falstaff, Preziosilla in La Forza del Destino, Federica in Luisa Miller, Fenena in Nabucco, Maddalena in Rigoletto, Azucena in Trovatore, Suzuki in Madama Butterfly,

She often sings religious music, such as the Requiems by Mozart and Verdi, the IX Symphony by Beethoven, Stabat Mater by Pergolesi and Rossini, Dies Iste and Risurrezione di Lazzaro by Perosi and Juditha Triumphans by Vivaldi.

She performed under the guidance of directors such as : Hugo De Ana, Beppe De Tommasi, Massimo Gasparon, Gino Landi, Pier Francesco Maestrini, Cristina Mazzavillani Muti, Pier Luigi Pizzi and Franco Zeffirelli.

She recorded for Bongiovanni the DVD of I Vespri Siciliani, La Forza del Destino and Thais. For Nuova Era she recorded the CD of Farnace by Antonio Vivaldi and for OPUS 111 Juditha Triumphans by Antonio Vivaldi.
